The Old Laundry Medical Museum at the Royal Berks(hire) Hospital is open on the first Sunday afternoon of every month (2.30 - 4.30). Admission is free and the museum well worth a visit.

It may be possible to organise a private visit for a Saturday afternoon or a weekday evening. Such a visit would have to be restricted to 15 persons at a time to avoid overcrowding, but it may be possible to arrange for two consecutive one hour visits so that 30 people could be accommodated.
